JUDGING THE PAST IN LIGHT OF THE PRESENT

"UPSTAIRS, DOWNSTAIRS" was a popular TV series depicting society in the 19th and part of the 20th century. The location was 'THE BIG HOUSE' where the family lived UPSTAIRS enjoying opulant, lazy lives, while the servants worked and lived DOWNSTAIRS in the basement, slaving long hours to meet every need of largely ungrateful masters.

It was a micro image of the reality experienced in all walks of life. Life then – in homes, in workplaces, in organisations and sadly in our Church too.

Authoritarianism was the order of the day: those in charge were all-powerful, all-knowing and un-challenged. In our church these people basked in the glow of the frightening title "SUPERIOR" and sadly, many of them believed they were! Society was based on the premise that the one in charge knew all and the only function of the UNDERLING was to obey without hesitation or question. No familiarity, no discussion, no socialising; total demarcation of roles. (In our county, not all that long ago, a bank manager objected to the caretaker of the bank becoming a member of a golf club because both would have equal status and horror of horrors - might be drawn to play together on week-ends!).

Children were to be "seen and not heard" and "to speak only when spoken to". Traditions and customs were strictly adhered to and handed on and accepted without question; a closed society where maintaining the "status quo" was the guarantor of continued good order. The TV series "Judge Judy" is a small throw-back to that era, where she regularly declares her superiority over anyone coming before her court and squashes any attempt to talk back by screaming "I'm speaking". End of discussion; "her rulings are final".

It hardly needs to be pointed out that the model for ordering society has long been replaced. The aims of the French Revolution could be loosely employed to describe our modern world-LIBERTY, EQUALITY, FRATERNITY, though many would question just how truly free, equal and friendly our present society is - but that is for another day.

Present society is so different from the past, that every aspect of the latter is easily condemned out- of- hand. To judge the past in light of the present in any area of life will inevitably result in the past losing out. Not everything was evil and unjust; people thought and acted and lived within the understanding and limits of the time. We don't fault people then for lighting their homes with candles just because we have electric light.

It is true that those who lived through those times suffered injustices and bad treatment and still carry an anger from the experience. Many who have read and heard of and write about these hardships and who have enjoyed "better times" are loud in their condemnation of the past. Without trying to excuse any evil or criminal behaviour it is important not to judge the past in the light of the past. Failure to do so gives rise to an unbalanced historical narrative and to dangerous generalisations. It also creates a demand for a scapegoat. The notion of the scapegoat rose from the Biblical tradition of symbolically heaping the sins of the eople on the back of a goat and driving it out into the wilderness- thus eeing the community of all guilt for past failures.

he modern-day scapegoat in Irish society tends to be the Catholic hurch. Unlike the innocent goat in Scripture the Church shares in the ast failures of society and is guilty of serious faults and has rightly een blamed for the hurt caused by arrogance, intolerance and sexual amage to children, but it is a convenient and lazy way for society to eal with its past and absolve itself from all blame. The Church then is a andy scapegoat for people who either don't know history of those mes or choose to ignore it.

he topical 'Mothers and Baby Homes" is a case in point. Sisters rightly carry responsibility for the bad experiences of many, but in the coverage of that sad period there is seldom if ever a mention of the families who disowned these girls and put them out on the streets. I have yet to read any reference to the fathers of the babies born to these mothers. The Sisters alone were on hand to take them in. Wrong doing is not to be balanced out with the good.

Both realities form part of the story and both deserve to be recorded for future generations. Priests and Religious who betrayed trust and departed from the Gospel are rightly condemned. Priests and Religious who served the needy by life-long dedication and self-sacrifice deserved to be acknowledged too. That tends not to be the case presently; society maybe too close to the events in question to be impartial.
