

FIRST SUNDAY OF LENT oth March 2025

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Although we are strongly drawn to follow Jesus, we will experience strong conflicts and temptations to follow "other gospels". If we stay with Jesus in prayer and friendship we can overcome such conflicts.





As Christians, we are called to conform our will to God's will. But this is extraordinarily difficult. Sometimes – perhaps frequently! – we delude ourselves and instead conform God's will to our will. The temptations of Jesus point us to three of

the most common ways of doing so. In the first temptation, Jesus is asked to allow his desire for material things (bread) to divert him from doing God's will. We live in a consumer culture and an unacknowledged addiction to consumer goods can often interfere with following the path of Jesus, who may ask us to let go of what we possess, in a life of loving and caring for others, especially the poor and excluded. In the second temptation, Jesus could become someone very important and this surely would help him in spreading God's message. We too can often want to be seen as someone more important than others, but Jesus, who came "not to be served, but to serve," calls us to wash the feet of others, in a humble spirit of service. In the third temptation, Jesus could perform an extraordinary feat of throwing himself off the Temple and not be harmed. This would win him the adulation of the crowds and so provide him with a large, receptive audience for his message. But Jesus knew that his message would be unpopular and lead to him being rejected, but this did not deter him from doing God's will. Our desire to be popular, to have status, to win the admiration of others, may sometimes deflect us from doing the will of God.





History Notes - Part 62


Rev. Edward Kavanagh and Napoleon:

Fr. Kavanagh, generally known as "Fr. Ned", was appointed parish priest of Ferns in 1786. He studied in France, where Napoleon Bonepart - "the little Corsican", was a fellow student. While there, he saved Napoleon from drowning, and in doing so was probably responsible for changing the subsequent history of Europe. The story goes that while studying in Bas Poicton, Napoleon's hobby was making machinery models and trying them out on a local watercourse. While a member of a shooting party one day with Kavanagh, Napoleon fell into a deep pool and was drowning. Kavanagh, quickly discharged his fowling piece and presented the barrel to the drowning man and pulled him to safety. Napoleon afterwards went on to rule half the world. An account of the incident was published in the "Dublin Penny Journal" in 1832. Fr. Kavanagh ministered in the Ferns area in the aftermath of the rebellion of 1798, where the animosity of the authorities towards the local Catholic community continued for several months. His thatched chapel at Newtown, near Effernogue, with other chapels in north Wexford were burned by Yeomen in the winter of that year, long after hostilities had ended. Fr. 
