# Focus

### **Profit and loss**

There is an phrase which goes, 'You never see a trailer being pulled after a hearse.' This would be a good way to sum up today's parable. Jesus tells us about a rich fool with a storage problem. He places his sense of security in storing up more and

more wealth, so much so that he needs to build bigger barns to store his grain. For all his wealth, he does not realise his life is about to end. Nothing is more destructive to the human spirit than a preoccupation with accumulating more and more 'wealth'. Driven most likely by a lack of peace, we try to constantly fill a gap which can only be filled by God. A preoccupation with "storing up" stuff also affects our relationships with the world, especially with the poor. For example, globally, one-third of all food, is wasted. It is a lie to say that we do not have enough for everyone. Mahatma Gandhi famously said, "The world has enough for everyone's need, but not enough for everyone's greed."

Humanity is at a crossroads where over-consumption is concerned in our world. We now know that the Earth and her ecosystems are at breaking point due to the continued exploitation of minerals and resources that are needed to feed our consumption habits. According to scientists, we would need three planet Earths to maintain our current rates of production. The parable today is urging us to focus on what is truly important. We start with ourselves.

"When nature is viewed solely as a source of profit and gain, this has serious consequences for society. This...has engendered immense inequality, injustice and acts of violence against the majority of humanity... Completely at odds with this model are the ideals of harmony, justice, fraternity and peace as proposed by Jesus." (Laudato Si', 82).

# **History Notes - Part 83** THE FAMINE IN OUR AREA

The greatest tragedy to hit Ireland in many years was the potato blight of the mid 1800s known as the Great Famine/An Gorta Mór. When the crop failed in successive years, the worst being 1847, many of the poorer people were faced with starvation. The population of Ireland halved over those years due death and large scale emigration, mainly to America and Canada. The hardest hit areas were in the west and south-west of Ireland. The government of the day was slow in relieving the situation. Wexford is said to have escaped the worst ravages of the famine years. The Workhouse system had been introduced to Ireland shortly beforehand and it gave considerable relief to the destitute. The New Ross Workhouse stood on the grounds of The New Houghton Hospital and the old walls behind the hospital, are a stark reminder of those days of hardship.

The town market in Robert Steet, now the site of our magnificent Parish Church, was the property of the town council and was pressed into temporary service as a fever shed during those years. The government ran work schemes to provide employment and a local reminder of these schemes is the road from Three Bullet Gate up to the Nash Turn and Dowsleys Barn. This road was guarried into the rock and the spoil was barrowed down to backfill New Ross Quays which were being extended at the time.

My father remembered delivering milk to the New Ross Workhouse (known as the Poorhouse) on Poorhouse Road (now Hospital Road) via pony and car from their dairy in the Maudlins, in the early days of the last century. **Courtesy of Jim Sutton**
