

The cost of discipleship

Today's Gospel is troubling. Does Jesus really expect us to hate our families, friends and even ourselves in order to be his followers? Reflect back on a time when you gained a new insight. When this happens, it often involves letting go of something we

were attached to – the call to "hate" our family is not to be taken literally but perhaps we need to break free from a habit or relationship that is holding us back. Attachment can cause all sorts of suffering in our lives. If we are to grow, this entails moving on from the comfortable and that can be painful.

In Laudato Si', Pope Francis calls each of us to become "painfully aware" of what is happening to our world. We know that the past 200 years of 'development' has caused widespread destruction of our world, altering the very fabric of our ecosystems. We consider 'development' to be measured by infinite economic growth. This is simply not possible on a planet with finite resources. Levels of consumption by humans are out of control; we have not considered the full cost of the "tower" (Lk 14:28).

The Season of Creation is a time to reconnect with the beauty of God's creation so that we can set out on more sustainable paths. This involves breaking away from certain systems which we once depended on and embracing a more gentle way of walking on this earth. It requires a drastic change of heart so that we can set out on new paths as a global community.

"The ecological crisis is also a summons to profound interior conversion...Living our vocation to be protectors of God's handiwork is essential to a life of virtue; it is not an optional or a secondary aspect of our Christian experience." (Laudato Si', 217).

Perhaps this Season of Creation, you might read Pope Francis' Laudato Si' and invite some people to join you.

There was a fine quay at a point near the Albatros factory site called The Franklin. It was on the site of the old Hearne's Mill and was a favourite place for swimming at high tide, long ago before swimming pools were created.

On a fine summer's Sunday evening a crowd of friends from Robert Street/Michael Street area headed for the Franklin at high tide. The band included Mr. Corish and his sons, accompanied by the Curtis boys and others. I was about nine years old and not yet a swimmer but I tagged along for the excitement. There was a big chain across the quayside stretching over the quay wall into the river. Amid the exitement and splashing, I tripped over the chain and went headlong into the tide, vitually unnoticed. I am sure I was half-drowned when someone noticed my yellow pullover under the water. A cousin of the Curtis family on holidays from Cork named O'Sullivan, dived in and rescued me. I was brought ashore and pumped out and I recovered quickly. Then Mr Corish took over. A fire was lit, my clothes were dried and everyone present was sworn to secrecy. It remained unspoken of and generally unknown in

Some years later, Mrs Curtis met my mother and told her the tale. Naturally, my mother was shocked and confronted me about the incident – "Why did you not tell us!!" My answer was eventually accepted - "If I had told you, you would never have let me out again" Courtesy of Jim Sutton


