

History Notes - Part 92: THE BRUGESSES OF ROSS

The Anglo-Norman founders of Irish towns introduced Charters laying down rules for the establishment and development of their new properties. The recipients of large tracts of land, who needed settlers to lead its development, offered the bribe of burgess status as a strategy to attaract colonists from Britain. The foundation Charters to towns granted plots of land to burgesses within the borough at a very small annual rent. These plots were known as burgess plots, with a specified frontage to main roadways and a substantial plot of land behind the frontage. Other privileges included freedom of movement and freedom from certain taxes and the right to selfadministration. In return, the town founders received rent, market tolls and court fines, and the town became a market place for the produce of their manors or farms. The early burgess became the traders and shopkeepers as they carried on their trades and utilised the plots for manufacture and storage of their produce. The number of towns and boroughs established in Ireland between 1169 and 1300 indicates the offer of burgess tenure succeeded in attracting large numbers of urban colonists into Ireland during that period. In our town, Mary Street and Michael Street still bear the footprint of burgess properties with houses fronting on to the street, behind which ran substantial plots of ground used by later generation as fruit and vegitable gardens.
