

World Day of the Poor

To understand poverty, we have to analyse wealth. The primary cause of poverty, in Ireland and elsewhere, is that too few have accumulated too much, leaving others with too little. But our western culture seeks to persuade us that we who have too much have earned it, by being

responsible and working hard (which is sometimes true.) And those who are poor are lazy, irresponsible and happy to live off the rest of us (which is also sometimes true). We all need enough to feed our families and pay the bills. But "enough" is never enough. Even some billionaires have been prosecuted for tax evasion! We are led to believe that the only security in life is financial security (despite the experience of the financial crash in 2008!) and therefore we owe it to our family's security to accumulate as much as we can. We are also told that what we have legally earned is ours and we have a right to do with it whatever we want. But that is not the message of Jesus. His message was one of caring and sharing. in solidarity with those in need. He told his followers to "give all that you have to the poor." That was possible in the early Christian communities which lived together and shared all they had. But today, that would mean becoming poor and seeking a bed from a homeless charity! But our caring and sharing is the only hope of reducing poverty. Perhaps Jesus' message today to those of us who have more than we need, would be "live simply, share generously."





History Notes - Part 98:

Irish Language in New Ross - The Irish language was commonly spoken in town before 1798. A visitor walked from New Ross to Dunbrody in June 1812 and observed that Irish was almost universally spoken along the way. It is said that the Baronies of Bantry (around New Ross) and Shelburne (below New Ross to the Hook) showed a continuing presence of native Irish speakers well into the 1800s. However, the first half of the nineteenth century saw a decline in Irish particularly associated with the emigration after the famine years of the mid-1800s. The 1851 census returns indicated that 11 per cent of the inhabitants of New Ross aged 60-75 were Irish speakers while none of the group 20-29 spoke Irish. The census of ten years later indicated only 3 per cent of the older cohort admitted a knowledge of Irish. Canon Cloney, Parish Priest of Templetown, speaking at the CBS centenary celebrations in 1948, said that as lately as 1900, twenty families in his parish spoke Irish only. He also said Irish was the common language of New Ross before 1798. Place-names from the Irish are still common locally Brogue Lane (brogue-makers were an imporant trade guild), Bosheen (a corruption of bohereen i.e. a little road), Bullawn (a hill plot), Kylebeg (a small wood), Camlin (cam-lin, a bent pool) are such examples. **Courtesy of Jim Sutton**
