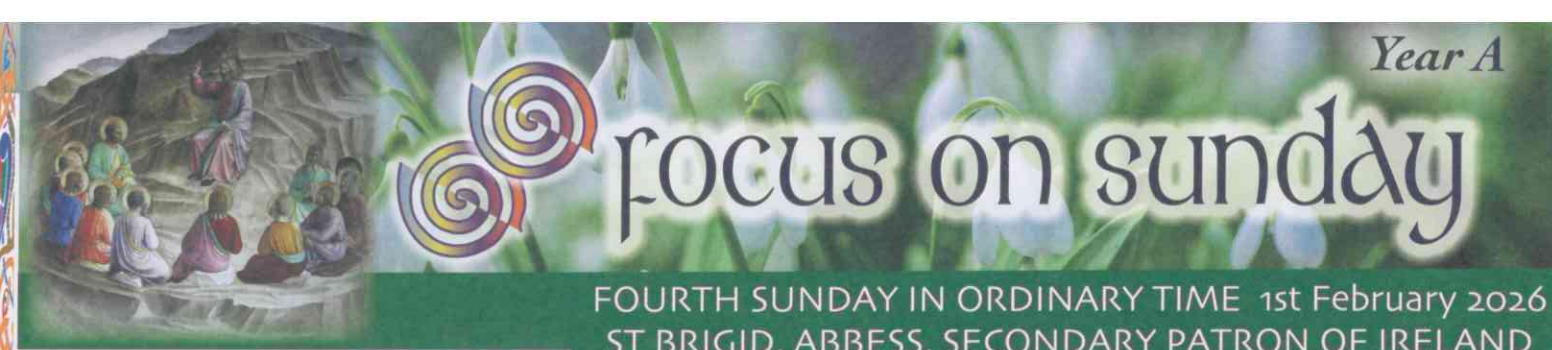

FOURTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME 1st February 2026
ST BRIGID, ABBESS, SECONDARY PATRON OF IRELAND

The gospel today is the charter of a Christian (The Beatitudes): Jesus' sermon on the mount. It is an invitation to live like him, and a challenge to serve him in our neighbour.



An alternate wisdom. Today we read and hear from the opening verses of Matthew's most famous passage, *The Sermon on the Mount*. The Beatitudes are at the heart of Jesus' teachings and are far from a tick box exercise in order to receive God's love, on the contrary, they speak a language of grace. They do not condemn,

rather they give us a glimpse of a life that is lived out of the call to love God and neighbour, spoken in a way that motivates rather than criticises. While the first part of each beatitude speaks about the present and is rooted in human experience, the second part invites us to contemplate what is to come. The Beatitudes are not idealising some future utopia either but are lived and experienced in the here and now. It sounds like a paradox or a riddle but here we are lovingly invited to grow into what the beatitudes praise. This is what a real metanoia (a turning around) looks like. As the Sermon on the Mount unfolds, we are invited into whole relationships, with God, with our loved ones, even with our enemies! The Beatitudes are a predisposition for what follows, like a compass, they orient us towards restoration. And the first Beatitude sets the scene for everything that follows: *"Blessed are the poor in spirit for theirs is the kingdom of heaven"*.

This Beatitude, ironically, praises spiritual poverty or emptiness and invites us to gently examine our inner attitude and attachments. For when we are free, we are open to receive God's grace in our hearts. The reward is not necessarily referring to the afterlife. The kingdom of heaven is a state of being that can be experienced in the here and now. The Beatitudes promise comfort, greater awareness and intimacy with God. Through the Beatitudes, Jesus blesses those that this world crushes: the meek, the peacemakers, those who are persecuted. They turn the world upside down with their dramatic reversals and are the essence of the in-breaking kingdom of heaven. This week perhaps you can spend time ruminating on one of the Beatitudes each day. See what arises. Living the Beatitudes in today's world involves living an alternative reality to the status quo. We are invited to dream and to take risks. What might this look like for you?

History Notes - Part 109:

GRAVES & COMPANY LIMITED

Graves was the largest and most important industry in town for more than a century from its foundation in 1811. The Graves family from the Thomastown area set up a sawmilling operation on the quays to process timber floated downstream from their lands in Kilkenny. The New Ross enterprise in time developed into a builders' suppliers business and manufactured roofing felt and damp-course materials in the adjoining factory. Graves Patent Roofing was a valued product In England during the First World War years. The footprint of the old Graves site is on today's Lidl property fronting on to the river. In its heyday, Graves New Ross operated several sailing ships which traded with the American east coast. It also shipped fertiliser from Peru's Chincha Islands. It carried emigrants from our quays to the New World, amongst them President Kennedy's great grandfather, and back-loaded pine timber from the Canadian Murmishi Valley. The firm had a shipping office in Liverpool and a member of the Graves family served as Mayor of that great maritime city. Today's Dunbrody Centre with its sailing ship, built locally as an exact copy of the original Dunbrody, is a fine memorial of the hectic days of emigration from our quays and is an outstanding tourist attraction. There is a story of an emigrant with too much to drink who woke up in his bunk as his ship sailed down-river and looked out the porthole. "Upon me soul" he exclaimed "only that I know I am in the middle of the Atlantic Ocean I would swear that's Carrigcloney!"


